AN ORDINANCE to amend the Pensions Ordinance, No. 175.

BE it enacted by the Governor of Trinidad and Tobago, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Pensions Short Title.
(Amendment) Ordinance, 1914.

2. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under the Pensions Ordinance, No. 175, or any regulations made thereunder or under any rules and regulations applicable to his particular case and not made under such Ordinance, becomes, on his final retirement from the service of the Colony, either a Director of any Incorporated Company the principal part of whose business is in any way directly concerned with the Colony, or an officer or servant employed in the Colony by any such Company, without in every such case the permission of the Governor in writing first had and obtained, then in every such case it shall be lawful for the

Pensioned officers not to accept directorships or employment in companies without leave.



Governor, with the approval of the Secretary of State, to direct that such pension shall forthwith cease: provided always that it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State, on being satisfied that the person in respect of whose pension any such direction shall have been given has ceased to be a Director of such Company or to be employed as an officer or servant of such Company in the Colony, as the case may be, to give directions for the restoration of such pension, with retrospective effect, if he shall see fit, to such date as he shall specify.

Passed in Council this Twenty-fifth day of March, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fourteen.
